

After Justin McCarthy flunked out of law school, he spent five years in a psychiatric hospital, where he began to draw and paint. After release, he worked odd jobs and grew and sold produce to support himself. Though his work appeared in an outsider art group exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art in 1966, McCarthy remained little known during his lifetime. McCarthy's subjects ranged from pop stars and verdant landscapes to historical events and bible stories. Here McCarthy employs claustrophobic repetition and a bird's-eye view to convey the noise and crush of "the great crowd that...went out to meet" Jesus (John 12:12–13).




A reading from the Gospel of Mark

Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately."' They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.



Celebrant It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**






Collect BCP 272





All Christians from any denomination are invited to share in communion. You do not have to be an Episcopalian or a member of St. Thomas in order to receive. Come forward when the usher invites you. Stand or kneel at the altar rail. Hold out two hands to receive bread dipped in wine and then take the wafer as it is given to you. Hold out one hand to receive bread only. As the second chalice passes, you may dip the bread in the chalice or drink from it as you wish. If you prefer not to receive communion but desire a blessing, cross your arms across your chest and a priest will offer a prayer of blessing. Gluten-free wafers are available at the altar by request. If you prefer to receive communion at your pew, please let an usher know.

News for this week

Holy Week & Easter Services:

Maundy Thursday, March 28:

5:30pm - Agape Supper in the Parish Hall – a simple supper of soup and bread **6:30pm** – Gather in the Nave for a ritual of foot washing followed by Eucharist. The service ends with stripping the altar of all adornment, a sign of mourning for Good Friday. Nursery care will be available beginning at 6:15. Children will go to Children's Chapel at the start of the service and join their families for foot washing, Eucharist, and stripping of the altar. This service will be livestreamed.

7:30-10:00pm – "The Watch". Come and go from the Columbarium (Chapel in case of rain) to pray as if you were staying up with Jesus in the garden. Devotional materials available. Priests will also be available to offer the Rite of Reconciliation.

Good Friday, March 29:

12:00pm – The Liturgy of the Day, with a reading of the Passion from John's gospel and adoration of the cross. Nursery is available beginning at 11:30. This service will be livestreamed.

6:30pm - Stations of the Cross will be set up in the Nave throughout the afternoon for individual meditation and reflection. A service of Stations of the Cross will be in the Nave at 6:30 pm. Nursery care will be available for the 6:30 service. Older children are invited to join their parents.

Holy Saturday, March 30:

9:30am – A brief liturgy recalling the burial of Jesus. We will also bless a new paschal candle and remember everyone who was buried under the light of the old paschal candle.

Easter Vigil, March 30:

6:30pm - We gather outside to kindle a new fire and welcome the light of Christ. We enter a darkened Nave and hear the Exsultet (an ancient Easter hymn) while we light candles from the new paschal candle. We hear the scriptures and a sermon in darkness, and then turn on the lights to welcome Easter and celebrate Baptism. Nursery care and children's chapel will be available. This service will be livestreamed.

Easter Sunday, March 31:

9:00am & 11:00am - Two nearly identical services at 9 am (no incense) and 11 am (with incense) with brass and glorious music to celebrate the risen Christ. Sausage muffins and pastries will be available outside and in the parish hall. Children and families are invited to flower the cross outside as you arrive. Nursery care and children's chapel will be available at both services. Both services will be livestreamed.

Reconciliation of a Penitent: Some Christian traditions emphasize the practice of individual confession during Lent. In The Episcopal Church, we call it the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent. Two forms of the rite are on pages 447 and 449 of the Book of Common Prayer. Form I begins with confession and ends with scripture and absolution (a declaration of God's forgiveness). Form II begins with scripture and ends with confession and absolution. The Rite of Reconciliation is not required or expected of anyone but is available for all who desire it. Many seek it out as part of their practice of repentance during the season of Lent. Contact any of our clergy to schedule a time for the Rite of Reconciliation. Lay people are also invited to share the rite with one another. Our clergy will offer this rite on Maundy Thursday evening from the end of the service until 10 pm.

Easter Pictures! First - Plan to take your photo in front of the Easter altar with the flowered cross on Easter Sunday between the 9 and 11 am services. This is a tradition we honor and are encouraging this year especially with renovations coming. Second - Please send us your Easter pictures from years past! We'd like to share these in a slide show on April 7 during our Parish Hall picnic and save them for history! If you have Easter pictures to share please email them to Meg@stthomascolumbus.org by April 3.

Nametags: We're encouraging everyone to wear your nametag to church! A sheet can be found in the narthex to request a nametag. Leave it in your car or purse, or in the wooden nametag holder in the narthex if you want to leave it at church. We do not make nametags for children without a request, for safety reasons.

Women's Lectionary Bible Study: Thursdays from 10-11am in the St. Thomas Library and on Zoom. Study the lectionary readings for the following Sunday in this one-hour class taught by the Rev. Cindy Cox Garrard. All women are welcome; you don't have to be a member of St. Thomas or even of any church at all. A study sheet is sent to each participant a few days before class. Contact the church office to register.

Evening Prayer: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 - 5:45 or so on Zoom. We gather on Tuesdays and Thursdays online at 5:30 for a brief time of prayer in the evening. The link is available on our LinkTree.

Prayer Group: The St. Thomas Prayer Group meets weekly to offer all kinds of prayers, including Prayers of the People shared on Sunday mornings. We also pray for those who have asked for prayers but wish them to be private. This list is confidential to the Prayer Group. Contact the church office to request prayers or to find out about being a part of the Prayer Group. The group meets in person in the Chapel at St. Thomas the first Monday of each month and online on other Mondays.
