Worship in Advent

A new Church Year begins on December 3, the First Sunday of Advent. The year is Year B in the Revised Common Lectionary, with a focus on Mark's Gospel. We begin each Sunday in Advent with prayers around an Advent wreath led by new members of St. Thomas.

Our **8:30 Eucharist** will be Rite I, the older language of the church, to help us center ourselves in a different way in this season. Our **10:30 Eucharist** will continue to be Rite II.

Wednesday Eucharist will continue at 5:30 through December 20 and will resume in 2024 on January 10.

First Sunday of Advent - December 3 Prepare for the Season

Dr. Denny Clark, former Parish Theologian of St. Thomas, joins us at 9:30 am to talk about what he has been doing since he moved away earlier this year. One of his new interests is the Tri-Faith Initiative in Omaha, a joint venture of Jewish, Muslim, and Christian congregations.

Advent devotions and candles for the Advent wreath will be available this morning. Sign up online by November 26 to reserve candles. Or, join us on Wednesday, November 29 to make a wreath from greenery. We hope you will decorate wreaths at home and share pictures.

Second Sunday of Advent - December 10 Welcome New Members & Contemplative Worship

At both services on this day, we will welcome and introduce new members of St. Thomas and pray for you in worship that morning. The Very Rev. Matthew Grunfeld, who grew up at St. Thomas is the preacher for the day. Between services we will gather for a Welcome Breakfast in the Parish Hall at 9:30 and hear a panel reminisce about earlier times at St. Thomas. If you have not yet joined St. Thomas but would like to, complete the form on the website at stthomascolumbus.org/joining-st-thomas or email the church office.

Also, Diocesan Confirmation services will be offered on this day at the Cathedral of St. Philip (2744 Peachtree Road in Atlanta). Those wishing to be Confirmed or Received into the Episcopal Church should arrive by 3:15. The service is at 4 pm and will conclude by 6 pm. We will organize a carpool for those who wish to take part.

Join us at 5 pm in the Chapel for the Contemplative Healing Service to listen, listen, listen -- to hear and be a part of Taizé chant, to listen for the Spirit in scripture, to pray and pray, and most of all, to listen to God.

Third Sunday of Advent - December 17 Lessons and Carols & Christmas Pageant at 4:30 pm

The St. Thomas Choir will offer a beautiful service of Lessons and Carols while the Episcokids present a Christmas Nativity Pageant during the Carols. Following the service, join us for a Wassail Party in the Parish Hall and a children's Christmas Party in the Youth Room. Bring a favorite sweet or savory dish to share at the Wassail Party. Fourth Sunday of Advent - December 24

Every so often, the fourth Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve fall on the SAME day. We will celebrate both. Both morning services will be in the Chapel at 8:30 (Rite I) and 10:30 (Rite II) so that preparations for Christmas Eve may begin in the Nave earlier in the week. Nursery and Children's Chapel will be available during the 10:30 service.

Prayer Group



Promise and Hope within the Promised Land St. Thomas Advent Lunches

December 4, 11, and 18 Noon to 1 in the Parish Hall

The hearts of people of many faiths are breaking as we watch devastating conflict unfold in the Middle East. Several St. Thomas parishioners asked for an opportunity to learn more about the history of the region and look at the current conflict from the perspective of faith, rather than partisan and political points of view. Join us for these informative sessions presenting a variety of perspectives on this complex challenge. May greater understanding lead to greater peace in our world.



December 4 - A History of Differing Promises and Hopes Dr. Denny Clark, our beloved former Parish Theologian, returns to begin the series. He will share an overview of how the promises and hopes of many peoples have shaped the region over the years and provide insight into what hope might look like today. Denny and his wife Toni Fisher were involved in the Bethsaida Excavations Project in Israel for 26 years, spending 1-4 months per year in Israel/Palestine for about half of those years. They now live in Blair, Nebraska, where Denny volunteers with the Tri-Faith Initiative, a cooperative effort of Jewish, Muslim, and Christian congregations in Omaha



December 11 - Jewish Perspectives on Promise and Hope *Rabbi Beth Schwartz*, Rabbi Emerita of Temple Israel in Columbus, will speak about what the Promised Land has meant over 3,000 years of Jewish presence within the region, varying ways of understanding that promise over time and across many Jewish communities, and current perspectives today.



December 18 - Promise and Hope within the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem

Rev. Judy Quick, a Deacon with our neighbors in the Diocese of Alabama, has served for several years on the board of the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, which includes many ministries among Arab Christians living in Israel, Palestine, Jordan, Lebanon, and Syria. She will speak about the ministries of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem past and present and about their hopes for the future.

This line from Mary's song of praise is our theme for the Advent season, recalling God's faithfulness in the past that gives us hope for the future. Making Room for All: St. Thomas Vision Campaign


We are in the midst of our *Making Room for*All Vision Campaign to improve accessibility on our campus.







St. Nicholas Night Service Project

In honor of St. Nicholas and in his spirit of giving, we will work together on an intergenerational service project on December 6. This year The Village Foster Care and Adoptive Ministry will serve more than 230 children and teens in foster care in the Chattahoochee Valley with new gifts for Christmas. We asked how we can help and they specifically asked for *donations of stocking stuffers for teens and tweens*.

We're collecting small items for teens and will bag them for foster families to pick up as they "shop" for gifts later in December. Items such as fun socks, lotion, fidgets, candy, journals, cheap jewelry and hair accessories, body spray, etc. will be collected. We hope to pack 75 bags. Look for a complete list of needed items in email newsletters and deliver items to the church office by December 4. Then join us on December 6 as we put the bags together. The Village is also collecting new toys and gift cards as larger gifts for children. Wynnton Neighborhood Network

WNN will serve 200 families (100 each day) for Christmas. Christmas distribution dates are December 18 & 19, starting at 8:30 each day. Donations are welcome to support their additional work this holiday season. Below you will see a list of needed items for weekly distribution and as well as items needed specifically for Christmas.


Welcoming a Refugee Family

St. Thomas is working with the IRC to welcome a Guatemalan family of three to our area as official refugees. The family has some contacts in Columbus and have asked to be resettled here. We anticipate their arrival on November 25. We have secured housing for them and almost everything we need to furnish their home. We are excited to have the opportunity to assist the family learning about community resources, transportation, ESL classes, healthcare, job searches and more. Brewer Elementary School Buddy Pack Project

We are SO excited about our newest Brewer Elementary School Partnership Project because it directly impacts the lives of the children we serve. The Brewer Buddy Packs Project puts food into the backpacks of 80 children living in food-insecure households on a weekly basis. Here's how it works: Brewer Elementary School teachers and counselors

have identified 80 students living in food-insecure households. St. Thomas Episcopal Church then purchases a month's supply of Buddy Packs from Feeding the Valley Food Bank at \$3.50 each. (That's 3.50 x 80 for \$280 per week x 4 weeks for a total of \$1,120 per month. For a 10 month school year that comes to \$11,200 per year.)

The on site United Way representative at Brewer then distributes Buddy Packs to teachers who discreetly place them in student backpacks on Friday afternoons. Buddy Packs include such things as easy to open cans of food items, granola bars, and juice boxes.

In this way, children whose most reliable source of meals is from school breakfasts and school lunches are also provided help with meals over the weekends. This costs us a little over \$125 per child. This program helps to reduce the stress of children living in hunger and not only improves the quality of their lives but their school performance as well.

Here's what you can do to help:

Donate. Please write a check or donate online to St. Thomas Episcopal Church Brewer Buddy Pack Program. Just specify Online or note on your check that your donation is for the Brewer Buddy Pack Program. \$14 supports one child for a month. \$125 supports one child for a year. \$280 supports 80 children for a week. \$1,120 supports 80 children for a month. Any amount helps. **Consider giving a year's worth of Buddy Packs to a student in honor of a loved one for Christmas!**

Volunteer. Volunteers are needed one Tuesday a month to pick up Buddy Packs from Feeding the Valley and deliver them to Brewer Elementary School. We meet at Feeding the Valley at 9:00 am and are finished at Brewer by 10:00 am. The next dates to volunteer are December 5 and January 9. Please sign up on the St. Thomas website

This Brewer Buddy Pack Project between St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Brewer Elementary School, Feeding the Valley Food Bank and the United Way shows what we can do to change lives when we work together. Thank you all for supporting our work!

Creation Keepers also shared these five ways to celebrate the holidays while still being environmentally friendly:

- **1. Gift meaningfully and shop locally.** Consider the environmental impact of the gifts you want to give. By focusing on quality over quantity of gifts, you can reduce the waste of unwanted items. Consider gifting an experience or donating to an organization that means something to them. If gifting experiences isn't your style, explore local shops to find the right gift you'll maybe even have a chance to get it customized. Shopping locally reduces vehicle pollution from transporting your gift to you, so shop from local sellers near you, on Etsy, or on social platforms.
- **2. Wrap gifts with materials other than traditional gift wrap.** One of the easiest eco-friendly swaps for the holiday season is to use alternative materials as gift wrap. Make the wrap a part of the gift by packing in items you already have around the house but aren't using, like a reusable tote bag, mason jar, or home storage basket. Fabrics like scarves, bandanas or burlap are quite the look when tied around the gift. If you stick to using paper, wrap the gifts with old newspapers, compostable wrapping paper, or even paper grocery bags.
- **3. Plan for food sourcing and storing.** The best part of the holidays is undoubtedly the food and, with a little bit of planning, it can also be part of your sustainable holiday routine. When deciding on the menu, go for local and seasonal ingredients to ensure a low carbon footprint as they won't have travelled as far to get to your table. When packing leftovers, instead of tinfoil and plastic, try using beeswax and reusable containers. Food waste is not unique to the holidays, but since we're indulging and most likely cooking a bit more during this time, see if guests are able to bring their own reusable containers to take leftovers.
- **4. Decorate your home with sustainable lights and trees.** Lighting uses a ton of energy, and traditional holiday lights create a spike in electricity generation. As a more sustainable alternative, use LED lights to decorate inside and outside, setting up a timer so they are only on when they need to be. For the holiday tree, look for containerized or potted trees in place of artificial trees so they can be planted outside once the holidays are over. Artificial trees need to be used for around 20 years to offset the impact they have when they are produced, making them the less sustainable option compared to real trees.
- **5. Set your home up for energy savings while you're out.** If you won't be home for the holidays, make sure you conserve energy while you're away. Smart thermostats allow you to set a heating schedule and control your energy use from anywhere.

This holiday season, spread the holiday cheer sustainably in any way you can depending on your budget and capacity. Every small act counts to reduce the waste and pollution that accumulate at this time of year.
